Make a list of a least ten good qualities that you express. Perhaps as you make this list you may think of qualities that you express but want to develop more consistently. This can form a second column of qualities to work on.

The spiritual qualities we express determine our success. It is not so much what we do (given that it's legal) as how we do it. For example, if we take a child to the park what is most important is expressing patience, joy, spontaneity. The same trip is spoiled by anger and impatience. The result depends on the qualities expressed.

The same holds true for most decisions in life. The decision to attend this college or another, take this job or that, live in this city or that is not how our success is determined. It is whether we are expressing good qualities. The more good qualities you develop, the more useful and productive you will be.

Each morning pray about what quality or two you need to be expressing that day. God will tell you. Then go forward with whatever the logical tasks are for the day. But instead of focusing on the tasks, focus on expressing your spiritual qualities.

If graduation is a time of change and uncertainty, trust that God has a good purpose and path for you to follow. Focus on the substance, your spiritual qualities. Practice expressing your strengths in every aspect of your life. Even if you choose the wrong path, your desire to do right and express your Godly nature will keep you safe until you hear more clearly God's guidance for you.
