How are we justifying immoral behavior? Are we in love? Are we lonely? Are we proving that others find us attractive? Are we being faithful but not wanting to be committed?

Any sexual relations outside the moral provision of marriage is being disobedient to the 7th commandment, "Thou shalt not commit adultery".

Proving our love by having sex without marriage is like the ancient ritual of sacrificing to idols. There is no power in an idol. It cannot make you happy. Cannot fulfill you.
